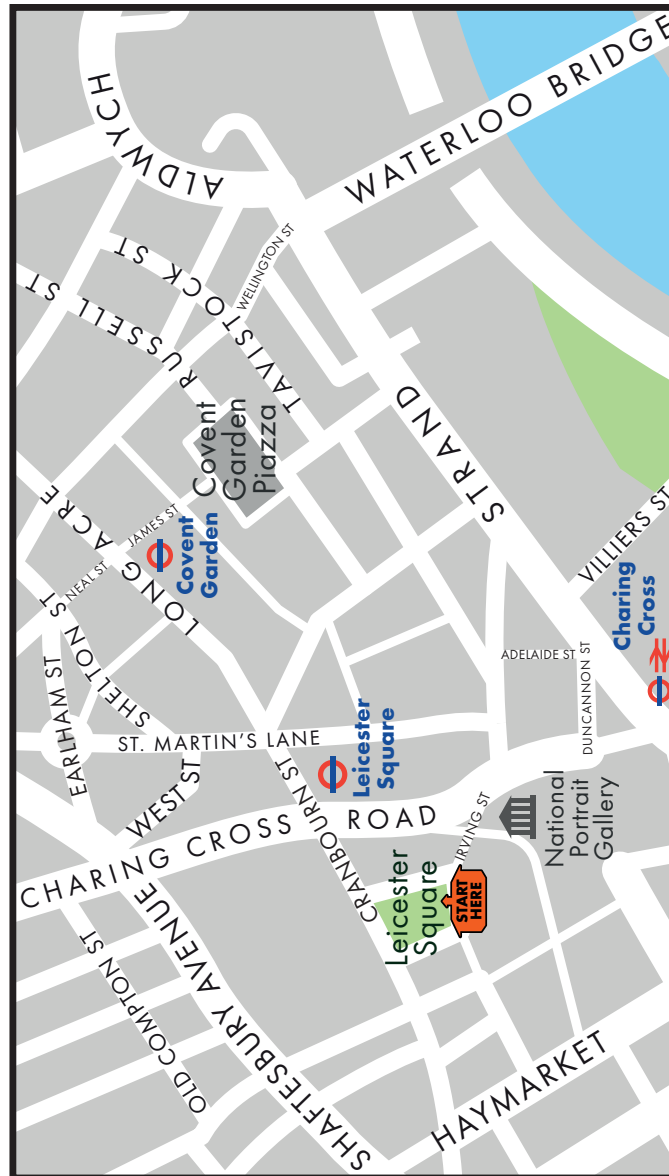
The West End can get very busy at times, so be sure you stay with your group and take care when crossing roads!

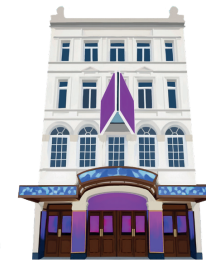
This map will help guide you around the West End!

How well do you know London's West End?

Your starting point is the Official London Theatre Ticket Booth

Use our map on the back for help getting around

1. Find the playwright in Leicester Square. What is their name?



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For fun, can you name one of their plays?

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Hint: Look in the centre of the gardens!

2. Next you'll need to find a rather large book. Head past Leicester Square Station and have a look on Cranbourn Street near the Arts Theatre. Can you name the lady in the book?

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Hint: She was an English writer of crime novels, short stories and plays!

Hint: What's on the book will help with the next question!



3. The above author wrote the world's longest running play which opened at this theatre in 1974. Head up St. Martin's Lane to find this venue. How many torches are on the theatre?



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Hint: Be sure to walk all the way around the building!

So far so good? Use the map on the back of this page for help with the next section.

4. Follow Earlham, Neal & James Streets to the Covent Garden Piazza. Can you find the name of the famous opera house here?

5. Head to the Lyceum Theatre (where lions may roar) on Wellington Street and seek out three famous names on the building.



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Hint: Try looking around the back!

6. Now walk along the Strand towards Charing Cross Station.



What theatres do you see along the way?

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Stop when you see a famous head where Adelaide Street and Duncannon Street meet.

7. Now you've reached the famous head, can you name who it belongs to?



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The quotation on the memorial is from the play *Lady Windermere's Fan*

8. On your final stop you will meet Henry Irving on Irving Street.

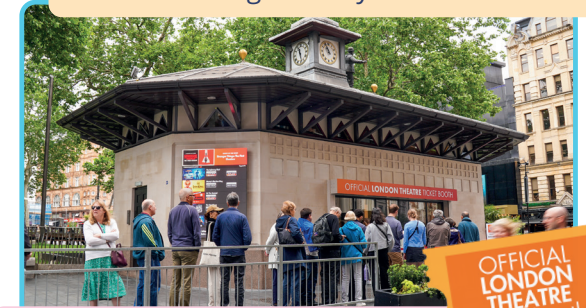
What year was Henry Irving born?



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Hint: He stands past the National Portrait Gallery and opposite the Garrick Theatre.

Sir Henry Irving was an English stage actor in the Victorian era.
